ANNUAL UPDATE

The Field Archaeology Group meet every fortnight during the summer months and have been working at Keig, Druminnor and on Bennachie. The Archive Group, as well as doing a lot of research on the hill, put on a great exhibition in April at the Bennachie Centre. The display banners from this exhibition are now being displayed at various locations in Aberdeenshire including Inverurie Garden Centre and Aberdeenshire Council's Woodhill House.

Colin Shepherd continues as the project coordinator and has been working with both Keig and Kintore Primary Schools. In September he will continue working with Kemnay Academy pupils, which continues the work of (Aoife) Leaf Gould who has now left the project to get married and live on Skye.

PEAT CORE & POLLEN ANALYSIS by Dr Ed Schofield Univ. of Aberdeen

As several of you may recall, around this time last year the Bailies of Bennachie assisted staff from the Department of Geography & Environment, University of Aberdeen, with the collection of a peat core from Moss Grieve, immediately east of the summit of Oxen Craig. The samples were taken so that the fossil pollen preserved with the peat column could be investigated. This technique – known as pollen analysis – can provide information about how vegetation communities growing on and around the hill have changed over time.

For your information, here is a brief account of progress to date towards this goal. The peat at Moss Grieve is surprisingly deep – almost five metres – and radiocarbon dating shows that, in this location at least, it has been accumulating continuously for around 7000 years. The pollen record contained in the peat shows that heather moorland has been present on the Bennachie Plateau since this time, but that mixed deciduous woodland (comprising Oak, Birch, Alder and Hazel) was



formerly much more extensive on the surrounding slopes and in lowland areas surrounding the hill. Sustained clearance of this woodland by the native peoples of NE Scotland appears to have

commenced in the late Bronze Age (around 1000 BC), and accelerated through the Iron Age, leading to the development of a largely open and pastoral landscape. The Pictish period (first millennium AD) witnessed some regeneration of Birch woodland or scrub around Bennachie, suggesting that land-use

was slightly less intensive at this time. Agricultural improvements are evident over the last three centuries, indicated by the appearance of increasing numbers of cereal-type pollen grains (Oats and Barley). A dramatic rise in the pollen of Pine and Spruce in the uppermost 10-20 cm of the peat column reflects the recent planting of these trees by the Forestry Commission and within the grounds of private estates.

Research on the peat core will continue with the aim of improving the resolution of the analyses so that these reach a standard where they can be published in an international journal. Thanks go to SNH (Scottish Natural Heritage) and the SSW (Scottish Sculpture Workshop) for providing funding for the study under the programme 'Year of Natural Scotland 2013'.

BAILIES WORK PARTIES

The last year has seen the work parties busy as ever with maintenance on the paths from Rowantree and the Bennachie Centre up to Mither Tap, constructing cross drains and clearing existing drainage culverts and ditches to prevent path erosion. Cutting back vegetation on the Millstone Hill paths network was also undertaken.

Two work parties were carried out to create a short path to a picnic bench with a view of Mither Tap in Dr Danny Gordon's Widdie.

This path should gradually blend in and naturalise. Hopefully more work can be done to extend this path in the future.

Tree planting was undertaken around the newly created pond not far from the Centre. This will be an ongoing project with lots more to do.

On other work parties, we trimmed the willow sculpture at the Back o' Bennachie and carried out tree thinning around the hill.

WILDLIFE POND

In March the Forestry Commission Scotland dug a new wildlife pond not far from the Bennachie Centre. In April the Bailies work party planted hazel, willow and alder in the area around the pond. Already there are signs of wildlife using the pond such as frog and toad spawn, pond skaters, fresh water shrimps, grey wagtails and there was even a brief visit from a pair of mallards!
